


Newsletter - Autumn 2018

THIS YEAR WE CELEBRATE 23 years of rescuing cats around the Worthing area - and with an annual average nowadays exceeding 150, our grand tally to date is well over 2,000! Truly, we all have something to be proud of at Worthing Cat Welfare Trust.

Efforts really are being stretched this year with 90 cats and kittens coming into our care in the first half, the most we have had in years. Kittens stay a minimum of 10 weeks and leave with a voucher for half the cost of a neuter or spay - and YES we do check to ensure the vouchers are used! Also, we chip, inoculate, worm and flea treat every cat and kitten that comes to us.

Finance - nothing happens without it!

YOU RECALL LAST ISSUE we were seeking a new Treasurer, but luckily (and happily) our quest is over. Christine Jones has taken over the financial reins from outgoing Treasurer Roger Lovell, to whom we owe enormous thanks for a decade of sterling service.

I had been a lady of leisure for a while, but always devoted to our cats with up to eight in our care at any one time. With my husband's full support, I applied for the position of Treasurer and have been in the role since July and learning fast how the charity works. It is even more time consuming than I imagined, but so enjoyable and rewarding.

I have joined at an interesting time. After two years of careful research, we have realised it is not really a viable aspiration to purchase a property for the purpose of running a sanctuary. The money earmarked for the sanctuary would have to be used in its entirety for the purchase of a likely property and we simply can't ensure enough income to fund the permanent staffing and the running costs. However, a "virtual sanctuary" has already been running across our dedicated network of foster carers for many years and our honest conclusion is that this needs to be developed further as the way forward.

Additional locations are being sought among our members and supporters, where we might be able to install accommodation facilities in their gardens or grounds with the trust fully funding construction and maintenance.

Other income from fundraising and donations is generally on a par with last year. However, costs have shown a significant increase, due mainly to vet services. We are proud that our *Golden Oldies* scheme has been so successful and we currently have over 70 cats in the scheme, but medical costs associated with caring for older cats are substantial.

In summary, Worthing Cat Welfare Trust is solvent and achieving great things, but we are very conscious of our dependence on legacies - without which we would gradually fade away. Therefore, if you possibly can, please remember us in your will.

Could you sponsor a sanctuary pen?

At any one time we have maybe a couple of dozen cats in our care. Happily, most are ready for immediate re-homing and last year we relocated 134 cats and 21 kittens. Others, however, need to be cared for by us in the longer term, maybe because they are still unwell, traumatised or simply too old to move on.

Not surprisingly, we need considerable accommodation to hold all these pussies in a safe environment and that is where our network of “safe houses” comes in. Our virtual sanctuary is currently spread across six locations, where our cats can enjoy every facility: safety, peace, good food, full medical support and daily affection.

But despite the enormous goodwill and dedication we have from our carers, the system can't run on air and water! It needs some of that good old-fashioned commodity - yep, that's the one: money!

So, we are inviting our members and supporters to become pen sponsors at an annual fee of £30. All sponsors would be featured in one of our newsletters and will be able to go and visit (by appointment) the present occupants.



Julie Stevens took on this role earlier in the year and business has been, well ..., very brisk. In the second quarter we had notification of 37 missing

cats, of which only 14 have not been found so far. When we are notified of a loss, we make very active use of Facebook to publicise it and we offer an immediate poster service to owners, so they can spread the word in their neighbourhood. But one thing is really clear, micro-chipping is the most vital rescue tool of all, so do make very sure yours are properly tagged!



Kidney Disease and New Remedies

Here in the first of a series of technical insights by local veterinary surgeons, Dr. Amanda Nicholls MRCVS takes a look at common kidney complaints and how new remedies are being researched.

Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD) is one of the most common conditions in older cats and in most cases it is progressive with the rate of decline varying greatly. The most common symptoms are weight loss, poor appetite, lethargy, thirst and increased urination. These reflect the loss of those normal kidney functions, which help maintain fluid balance, produce certain hormones and excrete waste products (through urine).

Although CKD is not curable or reversible, treatment can extend life and increase quality by slowing down the progression of the disease. Senior cats need regular weight checks to detect unexplained fluctuations and to note changes in food or water intake, then investigating further through blood and urine samples. As CKD is such a common condition, annual or six-monthly screening of all mature cats is strongly recommended to help early diagnosis.

The management of CKD is usually supportive if an underlying cause is identified, e.g. infection or kidney stones, so specific treatments can be used and may prevent progression of the CKD. Therapeutic renal diets are very beneficial and have been shown to dramatically improve survival rates. Cats with CKD are at risk of dehydration, so wet foods are preferable to dry, as cats obtain most of their water from food. Diet changes should be very gradual to increase the chances of acceptance of the new diet, which will taste quite different to regular cat food. If the cat doesn't eat the new food, you can try mixing a small amount with their usual food or something strong smelling to make it more appetising to the cat. It is very important not to starve the cat if they are resistant to the renal diet!


Cats diagnosed with CKD will need regular check-ups to monitor high blood pressure and anaemia, which can develop as the disease progresses. These conditions can be controlled quite well though with appropriate medication.

Currently, we are working with a major pharmaceutical company and a network of vets around the world to trial a treatment to slow the progression of CKD. If it proves beneficial, it will become the first treatment available to treat cats diagnosed with the disease and be a major step forward.

Kevin and Polly

Our beloved cat, Reggie, was seriously injured by a car in March of this year. Some very kind people took him along to Grove Lodge Vets and because he had been micro-chipped, the staff there were able to contact us immediately. But because of his serious injuries the kindest thing to do was send him on his way to Rainbow Bridge, so I held him while the vet gave him the injection and he just drifted gently away.

Anyone who has lost a dearly loved pet like this will understand the pain in making this decision and the hole that's left in your heart afterwards. To come home to an empty house with no furry feet rushing to meet you at the door is just awful. So we decided to contact Worthing Cat Welfare Trust about adoption. We wanted two and were shown the most beautiful, enormous tabby and white boy named Bubbles and in the pen with him was a tiny long-haired tortie/tabby female called Squeak. They were both so friendly and I was able to bring them home straight away. Reggie would have surely approved of these two, because he was also a rescue cat himself and had seven wonderful years with us before he was taken so suddenly.

We decided to rename our new additions – Bubbles became Kevin and Squeak became Polly. They settled in with absolutely no problems at all. Their previous owner must have been very affectionate with them, because of the way they allow our visitors to stroke them, showing no anxiety at all.

They are both great lap cats too. Kevin is such a big boy and loves kneading before he settles down. Polly loves her long hair being brushed and rolls over for you to stroke her belly. She's so tiny, but has a really big personality!

Don't Do Nothing!

Meanwhile we have to buy in food and bedding supplies, liaise with foster carers and catteries, make payments against the stream of invoices that come in every week, keep comprehensive accounting records for audit and publication. You still with us?

We promote the charity and our services through a broad range of marketing materials, exploiting social media and our new website to the full. Also, we organise and attend a range of external events throughout the year, such as fetes, car boot sales and cat re-homing shows, as well as running our own busy charity shop. There’s a lot more, but let’s paws here!
